## BC COOKIE POSTER CONTEST RULES

- Poster must be drawn on 35cm wide x 55cm high (14" high x 22" high) = half sheet white poster board.
- Poster orientation can be either vertical or horizontal
- If cookie is illustrated it must depict the current cookie made by Dare
- Posters may depict either the chocolatey mint cookie or the sandwich cookies, or both.
- Poster must be completely hand drawn. Therefore there should be no cut-out or traced characters or computer generated images or any kind. There should be no 3D additions, eg. googly eyes, fun fur etc.
- If Guiders and/or girls are illustrated, they should be wearing uniform.
- Posters must include a correct trefoil with the box around it. The trefoil may be any solid colour.
- There is a separate category for computer generated posters. These posters should be supplied in hard copy on an 8-1/2 by 11 sheet, either vertical or horizontal orientation.. This is an across the board category, not restricted to any single level

  2. Area selects the top three posters from each branch and sends these to Province
  3. Province selects the top poster in each category
- Please remember that these posters are to be used for advertising. Therefore, bold, clear information is required.

# BROWNIES

## PASSION FOR POTATOES

Time Required: 45 minutes    **Program Connections:** Healthy Living (Sharing Art)

### Equipment:

- 6 regular potatoes
- 1 sweet potato
- 1 “other” potato (e.g. Red Pontiac potato)
- 1 box (to hold potatoes and conceal what’s inside)
- 2 bags flavoured chips, removed from packaging into unmarked plastic bags
- CD or tape player and music
- Pre-made potato stamps
- Roll of newsprint (some newspapers will give you an end run of paper that has not been printed)
- Paint – assorted colours

### Instructions:

Introducing Potatoes to the girls

- Present the box to the girls and say, “Guess What’s in the Box”. Let them test the weight, shake it, etc. If they don’t guess right away, give a few clues.
- Once they guess, review facts about potatoes e.g., How do potatoes grow? Are potatoes nutritious? How many ways can you think of to prepare potatoes? How many kinds of potatoes can you think of?  
**Tip:** a Google search about potatoes will provide you with lots of information. Bring photos with you if you can.
- Take the potatoes out of the box and let the girls look at them.
- Pass the two different kinds of chips around and ask the girls to guess the flavour.

### Potato Stamping

- Prepare potato stamps ahead of time, cutting out shapes at the end of halved potatoes.
- Show the girls how to dip the potato stamp into the paint and stamp the newspaper. You can put 2 girls per sheet or give her each girl her own.

When the pictures are dry, cut the newspaper according to the number of girls participating

### A Game with Potatoes:

- Play a game of Hot Potato – the girls stand in a circle passing the potato from person to person. When the music stops, the person holding the hot potato is out. The girls sit just outside the circle, making another ring until the end of the game.

### Try Something New:

- Try raw potato – cut small samples of different types of potatoes – tasting or smelling them (tasting is 90% smell). Be brave!

**Service Project:** Have girls donate bags of potatoes to a local food bank. Girls could bring one potato for every Keeper they’ve earned or one for each year of their age, etc.

# CRAFTS

## TOADSTOOL SUN CATCHER

Number of people that can participate: whole Unit Time Required: 30 minutes

Program Connections:

- Key to Brownies #1
- Key to I Can #4C (using an iron/appliance)
- Key to the Arts #4

Equipment:

- Construction paper – 2 pieces, approximately 8½" x 11"
- Scissors
- White glue
- Wax paper
- Iron
- Old towel or sheeting
- Crayons
- Yarn (optional)
- Typed Brownie promise on white paper

Instructions:

Begin by reading the Toadstool story to the girls. Then do this craft.

1. Cut a piece of wax paper approximately 20 x 30 cm. Fold it in half, and then open it up. Let the girls scrape crayons onto one side of the waxed paper, and spread the pieces out.
2. Carefully fold the wax paper again, and place on a towel or old sheeting. Put another towel or old sheet on top and use a hot iron to melt the wax crayon. Girls can do this if supervised.
3. Draw a toadstool on a piece of construction paper. Holding another piece of construction paper underneath it, cut out the centre, leaving a frame approximately 1 cm thick. Then place the wax paper between the two pieces of construction paper, and glue all three together around the edges. Trim off any excess wax paper. This is a beautiful sun catcher – a craft from Germany.
4. Type the words of the Brownie promise on small pieces of plain white paper, and glue to the base of the stem.



This sun catcher can be taped to the fridge or a bedroom door. By attaching some yarn, it can hang in a window, or above a bed – and be a constant reminder of the promise that each girl makes.

# **BUTTERFLY**

**Number of people that can participate:** Groups of 4 at one time at water station

**Time Required:** 15 minutes per group

## **Equipment**

- Wide container that can hold about 1 inch of water, e.g., roast pan or plastic rectangular food storage bin
- Water (to fill up 1 inch of container)
- Non-permanent markers in a variety of colours; e.g., white board markers
- Coffee filters - cone style works best
- Scissors
- Paper towel

## **Instructions:**

Cone filters have a seam that runs down one side and along the bottom. The long seam will be the body of the butterfly. The cutting technique is like cutting out a snowflake; the seam edge is never cut.

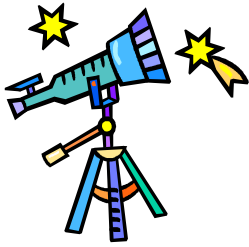
1. Holding onto the long seam of the coffee filter, cut out a butterfly wing shape. You are actually cutting through two layers.
2. Colour along the seam with markers.
3. Fill the pan with water.
4. Hold the bottom of the filter over water, slightly touching it.
5. Let the water work its way from the tip up to halfway up the filter.
6. Lay to dry.
7. When dry, open your butterfly.

## **Adaptation for Special Needs:**

- Cut filter for those who may need assistance.



## SNOW STARS

**Time Required:** ½ hour

**Terrain:** Outdoors (in winter after a snowfall)

**Equipment:**

- Pictures of simple constellations (Big Dipper, Casseopia, Little Dipper, Orion)
- Girls must dress in snow pants and jackets

**Instructions:**

- Give each small group of girls and one adult a picture of a constellation.
- Have them all shuffle their feet in the pattern of the constellation 'lines'.
- After all the constellations have been "drawn" in the snow and observed by all, the girls are then free to create "angels" in the snow next to their constellation.

**Program Connections:**

- Exploring & Experimenting

For those of Us who haven't seen much snow over the last few years ythis is a reminder.

**How to make a snow angel:** Girls lie down on the snow and move both their arms and legs in a wide sweep for a few moments and then try to stand up without disturbing the image.

## **FOLLOW THE LEADER AND FOLLOW YOUR HEART!**

Number of people that can participate: Maximum: Entire unit Minimum: 1

Time Required: 10 minutes

### **Equipment:**

- Valentine heart picture
- Diagram of an actual heart

### **Instructions:**

1. As a Valentine's Day meeting activity, talk about the symbolic meaning of hearts – being a friend and showing you care, sharing Valentine cards, etc.
2. Ask the girls about their actual heart.
  - a) Where is it? (about the middle of the chest, a little to the left)
  - b) What does it do? (pumps blood around to all parts of their body)
  - c) How big is it? (about the size of their fist; have them make a fist)
3. Ask them how they can feel their heart, and then show them how to feel the pulse in their neck, telling them not to use their thumbs. Most girls already know how to take their own pulse.
4. Then play a game of Follow the Leader, doing activities that get the heart moving (jumping, alternating arms outwards, kicking legs upward, bending, etc.). Once it's obvious they're working a bit, have them stop and immediately take their pulse again. Most girls are surprised at how quickly their pulse rate increases!
5. Finish with a discussion about the importance of looking after their heart and exercising to get their blood flowing. Talk about how often they should exercise and in what ways (through indoor exercise, sports, dancing, etc).

# GAMES

## It's Raining!

**Number of people that can participate:** Min: 2-4 Max: 6-8 Brownies

**Time Required:** This game is played throughout the meeting or for only a short period, depending on time available.

### **Equipment:**

- One double sheet of newspaper per girl to start
- One large mat or taped off area – big enough for all the girls to fit in standing on at least one foot (make this area smaller, not larger, than you think you will need)

### **Instructions:**

1. At any time during meeting the leader will either say “It’s Raining” or just hold up a sign if you want to be more challenging.
2. The girls will run and pick up one piece of newspaper over her head (as a tent).
3. After each time, some of the newspaper is removed from the pile so some girls need to share.
4. Keep removing paper until all girls are sharing their “tent”.
5. Towards the end of the meeting call “Flood” – all girls run and try to stand either on the mat or within the taped area.
6. This area should be small enough that the girls around the outer edge need to help their friends stay on the “island”.
7. After a couple of minutes, call “all clear” and the game is over.

## OBSERVATION GAMES

Forensic investigators must be very observant, able to spot tiny clues and remember the smallest details. Observant people also make the best witnesses. Play these games to test your own observation skills.

### 3.1 Kim's Game

#### What you need:

A variety of everyday objects. They may be related to a particular theme or chosen randomly.

- Cookie sheet or similar tray
- Cloth

#### What to do:

1. Place the objects on the tray and cover them with the cloth.
2. When the girls are ready, let them study the objects for 30 seconds.
3. Cover the objects again and ask the girls to list them all.

The more objects you use, the more challenging this game is. You can make it easier by putting the girls into small groups and letting them work together to name all the objects.

### 3.2 How Good a Witness Are You? Version 1

#### What you need:

- A partner

#### What to do:

1. Ask all the girls to find a partner.
2. While one partner turns her back, the other partner makes three changes in her appearance. For example, she might tuck in her shirt, put her hair behind her ear, and remove her belt.
3. When she has finished, her partner turns around and tries to identify the changes.
